

STRONG, SOARING AND STRIVING

The robust, all-female learning environment at Seton High School is something that is both inspirational and tangible. From every student to staff member, there is evidence of academic excellence, confidence, empowerment, spirituality and sisterhood. As alums, we all know this. For many of us, we do not realize the benefits of this atmosphere until years after we graduate. For Olivia Jones '16, she knew it before the end of her senior year at Seton when she decided that she was going to spend the next four years of her life as a cadet at The Citadel.



Olivia's first haircut in The Citadel's Barbershop in August 2016. The female hair standard for knobs (freshmen) is three inches on top and two inches on the side, to be maintained until Recognition Day in March of their freshman year.

Olivia and her father visited Patriot Point Development Authority which was established in the 1970s to develop a naval & maritime museum in the Charleston Harbor with the World War II aircraft carrier, USS YORKTOWN as its centerpiece.

"One of my favorite points to bring up is that I attended an allgirls high school but now attend essentially an all-male college with only 8-10% of the 2200 Corps of Cadets being female," said Olivia.

With such a distinct contrast of experiences, Olivia said that the benefits of Seton High School are extremely evident. "Being able to unapologetically be myself each day allowed me to have the confidence to stay true to myself in

> college," she explained. "Having the support and comfort of all-girl classmates for four years made it easy for me to bond with the other female cadets at my school and participate in an allwomen bible study."

Olivia is currently soaring in her academics during

her second year at The Citadel. She is a member of the Honors Program and has consecutively been on the Dean's List. She has also received Gold Stars each semester, which are awarded to students on the Dean's List who have made a grade-point average of 3.700 or higher for work in a semester.

She is double-majoring in French and Political Science with a focus in International and Military Affairs, and is minoring in Environmental Sciences and Sustainability. Olivia is currently spending the semester studying in Washington, D.C. as part of the Fund for American Studies program. She is taking classes as well as

interning with a consulting firm and will return in the fall to The Citadel as a full-time cadet.

In addition to taking credit classes, cadets are required to take ROTC classes for three years and pick a focus. Olivia is studying the Air Force, but all four branches of the military are options. "Cadets follow a strict 24-hour official sophomore schedule, meaning that aside from classes, our entire day is regimented," she explained. "We wake up at 0500 for morning physical training, attend weekly ethics training, practice and perform parade each week, eat every meal together and adhere

to a mandatory evening study period."

Olivia has also earned respected positions while at The Citadel. She has served as a Presidential Aide, assisting the president of the school with planning and execution of official campus events, parades and ceremonies. She has also been a Battalion Clerk where she is responsible for the daily submission of the Strength and Status Report of over 400 cadets living in the battalion, ensuring each cadet is present or accounted for and his or her medical status is accurate.

As for what drew her to The Citadel, Olivia attributes it mostly to an on-going family joke that turned reality. "My father speaks at various colleges and universities around the country and he always spoke very highly of The Citadel," she said. "It was a running joke in my family that I would attend, even though I had never even considered it until my senior year when my mom encouraged me to send an application there." Olivia applied and then headed to Charleston, South Carolina for a pre-knob visit, which is a day and overnight stay shadowing the daily routine of the freshmen. "I knew within the first five minutes of the welcome orientation that this is where I belonged," Olivia explained.


Seton laid the groundwork for this goal. "I truly believe that without the support of the Seton community I would not be on the incredible path that I am today," said Olivia, who valued being a student ambassador, dance team member and Kairos leader while at Seton. "There are so many people and experiences that guided me. Teachers such as Mrs. Jett, Mr. Brauch, Mr. Villing, Mr. Collins, Mr. Kellerman and Mrs. Linz offered me advice and always went out of their way to encourage and show that they cared for me," she explained. "They gave their time to really get to know me and became amazing mentors." Another powerful pillar in high school for Olivia was Kairos. "I was surrounded by wonderful classmates, faculty members and experiences that changed my life both when I attended and when I lead the retreat." And, of course, there are her Seton sisters. "Once I decided to attend The Citadel I was nervous what people might think, but everyone was enthusiastic and supportive, especially my AP Government and AP English classes who were there for me throughout the year to lean on, laugh with and helped me bring out the best version of myself," she added.

Olivia said she loves to boast to her current female classmates about the spirited Seton pride and unique high school experiences. "The memories of laughing uncontrollably with classmates, doing the Wiggalow during pep rallies and at games, and dancing to Ed Sheeran at his concert with my friends and the entire school are all experiences that I carry with me today," she said.

There are so many reasons that an all-female Catholic education gave Olivia a step-up as she headed into The Citadel. "Celebrating Mass, attending retreats and the simple encouraging environment at Seton is truly life altering," said Olivia. "Having the privilege of attending a school where you can openly talk about faith and God is so important. Learning to serve the community, turn to God and classmates in times of hardship and joy, and live for a greater purpose mean the world to me. Everything I am is because of Seton High School and my Seton Sisters."

After college, Olivia hopes to be a Truman Scholar and attend law school, focusing on International Law. She wants to work in policy, legislation and advocacy in our nation's capital. "Eventually my goal is to work for the United Nations," said Olivia. "I hope to dedicate my life to the type of servant leadership taught abundantly throughout my time at both Seton and The Citadel."

Evelyn Kluesener **Scholarship**

n 1975, Bob Kluesener, the father of Jean Kluesener Schwartz '60, Evelyn Kluesener Murray '66, LaVerne Kluesener Castelluccio '68 and Diane Kluesener Luebbe '75, was diagnosed with terminal cancer. Diane



was a senior at Seton that year. Without asking, the Sisters of Charity working at the school granted her a scholarship of \$100 to help offset tuition costs. In addition to four daughters, Bob and Evelyn Kluesener also had two sons. Evelyn Kluesener "The Sisters knew my parents were going

to incur many bills and wanted to relieve them of one burden, thus ensuring that I could finish my education at Seton," said Diane.

A year later Bob Kluesener passed away and those same supportive teachers were there at the funeral. What was even more meaningful was 30 years later when their mother, Evelyn Kluesener, passed away and some of those same staff members came to her funeral as well.

Jean and her family established a scholarship in their mother's memory to help more deserving students attend Seton. "My mother's legacy scholarship for Seton came about because she always remembered the generosity of the nuns and so she had designated that any memorials for her would be given to Seton," explained Diane."Like the story in the bible of the loaves and the fish, the small act of love and caring by the nuns has multiplied many times."




Seton Chapter of the Interalliance of Greater Cincinnati

Alumnae Spotlight

Dr. Mary Bredestege Newport '70



When it comes to women making strides in science, it seems like Dr. Mary Bredestege Newport '70 has always been on the cutting edge. Independent, inquisitive and willing to step out on her own. The qualities of being driven and vulnerable are what lead to discoveries and change, and they are also qualities that Mary stood high school years as a Seton Saint

out with during her high school years as a Seton Saint.

By the end of her sophomore year at Seton, Mary knew she wanted to go to medical school. "In that era it was common for parents and teachers to discourage young women from going to medical school due to the belief that it would be impossible to marry and have a family," said Mary, who also worked during high school at Good Samaritan Hospital as a Candy Striper and as a Pediatric Nurse's Aide.

"My counselor, however, helped me select the right science and math courses as well as encouraged me to take four years of Latin."

The Latin classes, in addition to four solid years of challenging math and science classes, are what Mary feels helped her earn a full college scholarship and gave her an edge to preparation for a pre-medicine major. "An interesting thing happened during my junior year at Seton," explained Mary. "I loved math and had finished all of the problems in the Algebra book fairly early in the year. One day I was doing my Latin homework when we were supposed to be working on problems in the math book, and the teacher, Sr. Ruth Mary, asked what I was doing. I told her what and why, and instead of becoming upset she spoke with other teachers and asked me the next day if I would like to move on to trigonometry as an independent study. This led to Mary taking calculus and physics during her senior year, which was only offered at Elder at that time.

Mary graduated as co-valedictorian from Seton and went on to Xavier University. It was the first year that the university went co-ed. Mary was one of just two females in the Honors Bachelor of Arts Program, and there were only fifty females in the entire university.

In 1972, Mary married Steve Newport (Elder '68). The two met while Mary was in high school and Steve was at Xavier University and they both worked at Good Samaritan Hospital.

Mary's education included Xavier University and the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. She became board certified in pediatrics and neonatology, and completed her training at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and Medical University in Charleston, South Carolina. She and her family settled in Tampa Bay where she practiced neonatology.

At a time when many women steered away from becoming doctors because of the expectations of wives and mothers, Mary stood out as a trailblazer and was blessed to have the support of Steve. The Newports had two daughters, and Steve was able to work from home to take care of the children.

"He was able to do accounting and manage my practice from home, which was great for our family," said Mary. Mary practiced neonatology for a duration of 30 years. During this time, she was the founding medical director of two newborn intensive care units in the area. It was also in the midst of her career that Mary began to notice some alarming tendencies about Steve, who was only 51 at the time.

"He began making accounting and payroll mistakes, missing tax deadlines, and forgetting if he had been to the post office or not," explained Mary.

"Over the next couple of years his memory and ability to do his accounting continued to deteriorate and he was officially diagnosed with early-onset Alzheimer's when he was just 54. By age 56 he could no longer do any accounting, drive, use a computer or cook for himself, and someone had to be with him all of the time for his own safety. By 58, he could no longer read or write more than a few simple words, had tremors, would walk very slowly and could hardly finish a sentence without forgetting what he wanted to say."

During all of this, Mary read everything she could find about Alzheimer's. She developed an interest in nutrition and what role it might play in the disease. In May of 2008, she came across a press release about Alzheimer's and MCT (medium chain triglyceride) oil. She was familiar with this because she had used it as a neonatologist in the feedings of the tiniest preemies.

"The medical food was not available on the market yet and Mary learned that MCT oil is extracted from coconut oil, the richest natural source. She figured out how much

screening and could not get coconut oil in time for the first screening," said Mary, who added that he did not qualify for the study based on those results. However, Steve received

just over two tablespoons of coconut oil a few hours before the second screening the next day. He gained four points on the memory test and qualified for that study.

"He said it was like a light switch turned on in his brain that day," explained Mary.

"I began to give him coconut oil and then also MCT oil several times per day with his meals and he had steady, very significant improvement that continued for a year before he leveled off. Eventually, he lost his battle with Alzheimer's on January 2, 2016, but I feel that we gained at least three to four good years that were better than the year before he started the coconut oil."

Mary is the author of *Alzheimer's Disease: What if There was a Cure? The Story of Ketones*, now in its second edition, with multiple foreign language translations. She is also the

author of *The Coconut Oil* and Low Carb Solution for Alzheimer's, Parkinson's and Other Diseases. Dr. Mary Newport has been an invited speaker on this subject for symposia and conferences in the USA, Canada, France, Greece, Germany, Japan, Singapore and Thailand, the University of South F

the University of South Florida, the American College of Nutrition, the Institute for Human and Machine Cognition, the Fellowship in Anti-Aging and Regenerative Medicine, the International College of Integrative Medicine, Weston A. Price Foundation, and numerous lectures for university students and for the public.
