A FOUNDATION OF FAITH AND MUSIC

Maribeth was raised on faith, values and a passion for music. "My upbringing taught me the significance of strong faith," said Maribeth, who was one of eight children. "We filled up two pews every Sunday in church, and me and my siblings all went to Catholic grade school and high school." Her father was a successful builder, and she feels that although they all grew up in a fortunate environment, they still had expectations placed on them. "We all had to go to church, get jobs and do chores around the house. We had a great work ethic," she added. The woman Maribeth looked up to throughout this time was her mother. "My mom was one of the strongest people I have ever known. She taught us everything we needed to know to be good, honest and loving people," she said. "My parents divorced when I was 12, and this was not very common with Catholics back then; but she was the best role model I could ask for – a woman of great faith."

As a young girl, she was drawn to all-things music. Her sister, Debbie, encouraged their mom to put Maribeth in piano and violin lessons. "She recognized my passion for music when I was very young," said Maribeth. Debbie, who was teaching orchestra at Seton and studying at the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music at that time, would bring Maribeth to all the shows and concerts at both Seton and UC. Maribeth also learned how to play the trumpet during these years from Elder Band Director Lee Trauth. By the time she got to Seton as a freshman, there were too many girls signed up for piano and trumpet, so Maribeth was assigned to play the French Horn. "I kind of taught myself to play," she said with a laugh. "I was horrible, but it was a good experience to play a difficult instrument with an orchestra."

The shy grade-school girl gained confidence throughout her four years at an all-girls high school. "When I arrived at Seton I came out of my shell and found my new self," she explained. "I don't think I would have thrived as much with boys in my classes, but I did perform on stage with them in the Seton-Elder Series at Eight and that was a great experience." In addition to her musical interests, Maribeth also loved her English literature classes. "I fell in love with Shakespeare and classic books. Beautiful stories, especially love stories, are what make performing arts shows wonderful," she said.

S. Mary Therese Thorman, who was Seton's music teacher at that time, had a big impact on Maribeth. "I wasn't sure if I wanted to pursue a career in performing or in teaching," said Maribeth, who also began singing at weddings and funerals while she was a teenager. "S. Mary Therese sat me down and discussed the pros and cons of each. She also had me teach a couple of lessons in music theory to the chorus class in order to give me a taste of teaching. It was a major reason I decided to become a teacher and put my performing career as secondary."

S. Mary Therese felt it was a privilege to teach Maribeth. "She was an enthusiastic musician spending two class periods

each day making music with her beautiful soprano voice in chorus and as an excellent accompanist playing the piano in orchestra," S. Mary Therese said. "When she decided to study music in college I was excited for her and not surprised."

Maribeth majored in voice and minored in piano at Northern Kentucky University where she earned her Bachelors of Music Education in 1985. During her years there, she helped Sr. Mary Therese with Seton music events. "Not only was I so grateful for her help with various musical tasks," explained S. Mary Therese, "but she was also such a positive role model for the students. I could well imagine her as a music teacher with music and stage experience plus a solo voice." When one of these two women was ending her teaching career at Seton, the other was finishing her college degree. "Sounded like more than a coincidence to me," said S. Mary Therese. "I asked her if she wanted to apply for my job. Although you never can predict the future and its possibilities or where God may be calling you, I expressed to Maribeth my hope that she would be able to stay for some years. Little did I know that she would triple my years at Seton!" At the age of 21, directly out of college, Maribeth started her teaching career at Seton.

Another very influential person in Maribeth's life has been Mr. Dave Allen.

"He has been my mentor before and after I began teaching. With his favorite phrase of 'everything's going

to be just fine,' and through his actions, Dave taught me how

to stay calm in any crazy situation that comes along," said Maribeth. "He also helped

me understand how giving our time and talents to the community is so important; and also how I was, in fact, making a difference." After about two years of teaching at Seton, Maribeth was concerned about making a living

from a Catholic school teacher salary and thought she should start looking for other jobs, so she asked Dave if he would write a recommendation letter for her. His response was "Oh my, who would ever replace you?", and he went on to explain how she was making an impact already in the lives of her students. "That day I changed my mind and never applied anywhere else," she said.


Dave saw Maribeth's strengths both during high school and as a teacher. "As a student she was always very involved and as a teacher she was instrumental in the performing arts," said Dave, who started the unique Seton-Elder Performing Arts program over 50 years ago.



"She has always been excellent in relating to the students and staff and bringing fresh ideas to the program. She is such a gifted person in all areas and genres. Maribeth is such an asset to the entire community," he added.

She also found a great friendship early in her teaching career with Lois Haneberg Childers '77, who has been a teacher in Seton's Math department for over 35 years. "She was the orchestra director when I first started teaching and has always been such a great mentor and one of my best friends," said Maribeth. "She is truly one of the most amazing teachers that I've worked with. The students see how much she loves to teach and she inspires all of us."

As a young teacher, Maribeth had the advantage of being so close in age to her students which made it easy for her to connect with them. "I took classes to improve my teaching, and I learned how to read personalities to see what individual students' needs





She had some great success with teaching in those early years, including her first-ever Christmas concert as a teacher in 1985. "The choruses were amazing that year, and I felt proud to be their teacher," she said. In 1988, the choruses from Seton, Elder and St. William had the honor of performing with John Denver in downtown Cincinnati. "John Denver himself tried to call Dave Allen to talk through some details, and when he couldn't get a hold of Dave, John called me. When I hung up I hardly remember what we even said because I was so shocked that he called me," she explained. "I looked so young at that concert that I ended up

A COMMUNITY OF STRENGTH AND GRACE

Regardless of whatever life has handed her, Maribeth has always given her time, talents and passion back to the community. Likewise, she has always felt incredible support from the community and her Seton family through her most faith-shaken times. In 1998 she relied on the love, prayers and support from her Seton family and the entire community after the Maribeth and her devastating loss of her seven-year-old son, Tony, sons, Sammy who was born with congenital heart defects and and Tony died during a surgery to repair pulmonary branch stenosis and some heart valves. In addition to focusing on continuing to be a mom to her five-year-old son, Sammy, she leaned on her faith, family and friends to carry her. "When my son, Tony, passed, my Seton family was just as important as my immediate family. Tony and Sammy had always come to rehearsals after school with me. They would ride their tricycles around the auditorium while I was at the piano, and my students played with them," explained Maribeth. "When Tony didn't survive his heart surgery, the entire school felt the pain because they knew him. Seton offered their support immediately. Several faculty members performed music at the funeral Mass. Fr. Steve Angi, who was on our staff, presided at the funeral. Tony's wake was in the cafeteria because we needed a large area where many people could attend. The students took up a collection, and people sent cards, food and gift cards which really helped me get by. I was a single mom by this time raising two kids on a teacher salary. It would've been so much more difficult without my Seton family. This made

'three bonus children'. She felt grateful to be able have so much love and so many blessings in her life. It was also around this time that Maribeth was watching The Today Show one morning and was inspired by a feature about Pantene Beautiful Lengths where someone had their ponytail cut off on live television to raise awareness for the organization. Since she had been growing her hair out during this time, she had the idea of cutting her own hair to donate and thought maybe some Seton students would want to do it with her. "I thought this could possibly be big, but I didn't realize how huge it would grow to be!" said Maribeth. The first Pantene Beautiful Lengths event at Seton was held in 2010. Students, staff, alums and friends of Seton all showed up to donate and to support. "Many of those who came to the event had lost their hair at some point to chemotherapy," she said. It was a great success

in which over 350 people donated their hair. "I was never more proud to be a Seton Saint," said Maribeth.

In order to keep the Pantene Beautiful Lengths

donation successful, it was decided that Seton would do the event every three years so that students could have time to grow their hair out to the required length of an 8-inch ponytail to donate. In 2013, over 500 students and community members donated; and in 2016, the last time that the event was held due to

changes in how wigs were made, there was a record number of 633 people who donated simultaneously, and the event was shown live on national news. "We all have been touched in our lives in some way by cancer," said Maribeth, "and this was a powerful and meaningful way to make a difference."

Throughout her career, Maribeth has coordinated several trips for her music students to learn more. They've been to places like Chicago, Nashville, Gatlinburg, Virginia Beach, Renfro Valley, Toronto/Niagara Falls and New York City. The first time she went to New York City with a group from Seton was 2002; and it was also the first time Maribeth had ever been to a Broadway show. "I fell in love with Broadway and made it a mission of mine to bring students to shows there, especially musicals," she explained. "I am so proud to be part of several of their first Broadway experiences!" She has also coordinated trips for Seton alums and their families as well and is in the process of planning more.

A FULL HEART

Performing has always been Maribeth's passion. Which is why after 35 years of teaching in the classroom at Seton, she

retired in the spring of 2020. "I like to say that I'm not really retired but just retired from the classroom. Of course, I haven't

left," she said with a laugh. "I still accompany on piano and keyboard for the music shows, including the annual spring musical." She also oversees hair and make-up and makes sure there are people to help with costumes and props. "It keeps me super busy, but I love it." She also still directs the chorus and still performs with the Cincinnati Metropolitan Orchestra. "Justin Kohler and Marco Colant have taken over in the Seton Music department and they are doing an excellent job," she added. "Mary Telger Sunderhaus '80 is still there and she keeps them in line," she joked.

Maribeth said she feels incredibly blessed to be where she is today. She and Larry now have five grandchildren. Maribeth has been able to pour more time and energy into her family and passion into her career. "I've been performing steadily ever since retiring from teaching, and I love it. People ask where I perform and I tell them in about every west side drinking establishment plus others," she said with a laugh. She can be heard belting out some of her favorites like "Don't Rain on My Parade" or "Natural Woman" in addition to many others. "These songs have amazing lyrics and melodies with a lot of attitude," said Maribeth. Her list of favorite artists is long and covers a variety of genres. "Artists like Billy Joel, Tom Petty and Sheryl Crow, to name a few, have a superior ability to combine lyrics with melodies," she said. "And when it comes to classic Broadway, I'm obsessed with George Gershwin and Cole Porter." But she never leaves out the females in the business that inspired her desire to perform. "Trailblazers in pop music include Ann and Nancy Wilson from Heart, Pat Benatar, Shania Twain and Dolly Parton," said Maribeth, who added that she could quote Dolly Parton's famous oneliners all day. Her favorite one? "If you want the rainbow you have to put up with the rain." And Maribeth is certainly enjoying the rainbow these days. She recently joined another band that she will perform with in addition to her solo act. She embodies what the strength of a woman means, and she continues to inspire so many of us. She truly loves that she is performing and there is a good chance that if you're out at a local west side establishment you may see her singing her heart out. "My husband, Larry, and my son, Sam, are my roadies," she said. "Life is good."

Class of 1968 Comfort Bags

About five years ago Donna Bley Maley '68 was diagnosed with a rare cancer and started chemotherapy as part of her road to recovery. During this time, she still made an effort to meet with her Seton sisters from the Class of 1968 for the monthly luncheons at Jim & Jack's On the River. "At one of the luncheons I brought up the idea of making care packages for any classmates, friends or family members who were going through cancer," said Donna. The idea of Comfort Bags was sparked in the hearts of these Saints that day.

The group soon created a mission statement and created the first bag. Since then, more than 80 Comfort Bags have been delivered to people who are fighting cancer. There have been money and items donated from at least 75 members of the Class of '68. "Our donations are always ongoing and we are always happy to receive them," Donna said. "Each Comfort Bag consists of several different things to help an individual going through cancer and even more specifically for those in chemotherapy. "We love what we do and we want people to know that we are praying for them."

In addition to items like photographic history books, word searches, tissues, hand cream, a deck of cards, a St. Peregrine medal, prayer cards, a journal and many other must-haves, there are also the special touches from this group where these ladies have shared their talents to help others during this very trying time. Gail Shotwell Chastang '68 crochets and donates all of the hand warmers and prayer squares, Lynda Honerkamp Schroeder '68 makes and donates a beautiful stained-glass heart, and Mary Lou Krizsa '68 makes and donates the blankets.

So much time, talent, treasure and true Seton sisterhood goes into each and every Comfort Bag. However, the ladies from the Class of '68 are quick to tell you that much of





Andrea Toth '13 attended the University of Dayton from 2013-2017 where she received her Bachelor of Chemical Engineering with a minor in bioengineering and a concentration in premedicine and graduated Magna Cum Laude. "I was able to finish this combined degree in four years while working other jobs and also

practicing nearly full time as a volunteer EMT," Andrea said. "I conducted research at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and was selected to be part of the ROSE program at the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine with an early admission to medical school," she added. Andrea subsequently was accepted to the UC Medical Scientist Training Program, or MSTP. This program is facilitated by UC's College of Medicine, CCHMC and the National Institutes of Health, or NIH. The program, which Andrea anticipates to graduate from in 2025, gave her the opportunity to combine clinical medicine (MD degree) with academic research (PhD degree). The MSTP program is a full-funded scholarship where she has received full tuition for medical school and graduate school as well as a living stipend. During graduate school she published several high-impact first-author manuscripts that are directly relevant to human health. Throughout that same time, she also

completed additional coursework to fulfill requirements for a Graduate Certificate in Biomedical Informatics. After graduation she plans to pursue a residency that combines clinical care and research with the goal of being a critical care physician who researches the lung injuries that impact many ICU patients. "My ultimate goal is to practice translational research, meaning that I will spend part time in the clinic likely doing ICU/critical care and the rest of the time doing research to inform patient care – likely in studying how to promote proper repair/regeneration in the lungs after injury," she explained. Andrea felt inspired through classes and activities during her high school years at Seton. "Seton inspired my interest in math and science, and also gave me the confidence to pursue and thrive in chemical engineering, a degree where women are typically in the minority." Through her AP courses, she was able to get ahead in college coursework and finish an engineering degree with extra pre-medicine classes in four years. "In addition to academics, Seton taught me the importance of getting involved in my community," added Andrea. "Through my experiences at Seton, I was driven to step out of my comfort zone and challenge myself academically, personally and in the professional world of science and medicine."

Alumnae Spotlight

Pam Ehrman Kent '81

The word miracle is used in various ways and for a variety of purposes. From light-hearted to literal, religious

or non-religious, miracles are part of our everyday language and perspective of life. The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines a miracle as "a sign or wonder such as a healing, or control of nature, which can only be attributed to divine power." Pam Ehrman Kent '81 is proof that miracles happen; and she believes that she is alive today to share her story because of the intercession of S. Blandina Segale, SC, a Sister of Charity currently being considered for sainthood who attended Cedar Grove Academy and was

also an educator, missionary, caretaker of the sick and co-founder of Santa Maria Community Services Inc.

If you meet Pam Kent just one time you will immediately feel her contagious positivity, zest for life and inclusive spirit. Her faith, strength and love of family and friends have always been a big part of who she is. When Pam was at Seton, her vibrant energy could be felt by the whole student body, who voted her as Student Council President her senior year. "I was very involved in promoting the student community and wanted to make all the students feel included no matter what they were involved in," said Pam, whose mom Betty Metz Ehrman '55 and sisters Patti Ehrman Lahni '77 and Becky Ehrman Specker '85 are also proud Saints. Pam had a large calendar put in the cafeteria to encourage everyone to support one another. Student Council planned the first-ever student walk that year in addition to planning many activities with the boys next door at Elder, which is where she met Terry Kent ('78 Elder). In addition to the students, Pam had great respect for the staff and administration, including Seton's principal at the time, S. Kathryn Ann Connelly. "I thought it was important to show our appreciation to the entire faculty, so we provided baked goods for them every month."

The leadership skills and empowerment she gained while at Seton helped her have the skillset and confidence to open her own business in 1983 at the age of 20. "What I learned at Seton and the opportunities provided to me

gave me the foundation to open my own hair salon and be successful.

For the next 20 years, Pam ran her business while also getting married in 1987 to Terry and starting a family. As her kids, Steven ('10 Elder), Bridgette Kent Cooper '06 and Adam ('21 Elder) grew and became involved in school activities, Pam took on more voluntary roles with St. Dominic, Seton and Elder. "Being a Seton Saint taught me how to embrace sisterhood through many different groups of friends in my life – whether it is book club, lunch with a group of moms, lasting friendships with volleyball or Glee Club moms or forty-year friendships with my Seton classmates."

Pam has always embraced life and whatever obstacles came her way. What started out as a cold and bronchitis in January 2014 transpired into an inexplainable lifethreating illness. Within a few months of not getting any better, Pam found herself in the hospital where her oxygen levels were in the 60s. "I was in the ICU for 10 days and went home on oxygen," said Pam, who was discharged without any clear answer or diagnosis. She put one foot in front of the other to get through the next few months without any progress in her condition. By July she was back in the ICU for 10 more days where the doctors came up with a bleak prognosis of pulmonary fibrosis/interstitial lung disease and told her that she had two years to live. "It was absolutely devastating," said Pam. A month later she was back in the ICU but was

determined to get out of there in time to attend her son Steven's White Coat Ceremony with the University of Cincinnati School of Pharmacy and was happy when she was able to do so.

Pam knew she needed to try everything to avoid the scenario of being on oxygen for the rest of her life. Much to her frustration over the next few months, she wasn't getting any better; but Pam didn't give up on her faith. She attended 4:30 p.m. Mass every Saturday at St. Dominic. "Each week I would see S. Kathryn Ann Connelly and S. Catherine

Kirby," explained Pam.
"They would ask me how I was doing, but S. Kathryn Ann could see that I was declining in health. In March of 2015 she brought my situation to the attention of the other Sisters of

Charity." Unknown to Pam at the time, the Sisters all began to pray daily to S. Blandina Segale throughout the next year, asking S. Blandina for her intervention with Pam in the form of a miracle that would heal her.

There were some ups and some downs over the next few months, including in July 2015 during a procedure where one of her lungs was accidentally nicked and air escaped from the lung into the body causing a medical condition called crepitus. But prayers continued, and by January of 2016, Pam started to feel better and began weening off the

oxygen without any explanation from her doctors as to how this could be happening. In March 2016, one year from when the Sisters of Charity started praying to S. Blandina for a miracle, Pam was

completely off oxygen. In September 2017, she was released from her pulmonologist without any logical reason for her complete healing other than that it was a miracle.
