God gives us free will. We can choose to walk through life alone, in our own strength, or we can walk with God and be blown away by all the ways He reveals His love to us.

”

That quote from Lisa Voss LaRosa captures how she is walking through life every moment of every day. It’s a perspective that her daughters, Olivia and Erika, also share. In fact, they have quite a bit to do with the way that Lisa has embraced this way of life. In turn, Coach LaRosa, as she is mostly known around Seton, has taken the hands and hearts of so many Seton Saints, guiding them to embrace this same outlook along their own journeys.

As a teenager, Lisa’s drive and passion for sports was evident. She was on one of the first west side ‘select’ soccer teams in the area as a middle schooler, and when she went on to Oak Hills High School, she was a four-year member of the varsity soccer team, basketball team and track and field team. She also

spent one year on the swim team. “I loved being involved in sports every season,” said Lisa. “During preseason freshman and sophomore years, I had to ride my bike to the two-a-day practices at Springmyer school on Ebenezer. I lived in Delhi off Martini Road, and I didn’t think twice about the distance or safety, I just did it and I loved it,” said Lisa, adding that she also would do extra running in her neighborhood to get faster and stronger.

She graduated in 1985 with a new school record for high hurdles in track and field, and she held onto that record for five years. “I do believe Seton athletes’ times now would crush my best time from 1985,” she said with a laugh.

Lisa attended Cincinnati State and graduated in 1988 with a degree in Marketing Management. Lisa married Mike LaRosa in 1992, and later that year their first daughter, Olivia, was born. In 1995 their second daughter, Erika, was born. Life was busy but blessed for Lisa with two daughters and two older stepsons, Nick and Ryan.

The high school years for both Olivia and Erika brought great growth opportunities in many areas, especially in faith.

Olivia transferred to Seton in 2008 during her sophomore year. She was born with a hearing impairment, so the LaRosas navigated through high school decisions trying to find the best fit. They ultimately felt that Seton was where Olivia was supposed to be, where she would be surrounded in an environment that would help her succeed academically, emotionally and through school activities. Olivia played soccer during freshman year at her previous school. “She was a fierce little defender,” explained Lisa. “She had to have two surgeries – one going into freshman year for a displaced patella and then one after she tore her meniscus that season,” Lisa explained, adding that after the last surgery they knew it was time for Olivia to hang up her cleats.

“When I transferred to Seton, it was a turning point for my confidence – spiritually and emotionally,” said Olivia. “I remember feeling very anxious. I will never forget my first day at Seton and how warm and welcoming all the students, teachers and staff were towards me. I met many new friends that day, and I was overwhelmed by the positivity and spirit-filled community that existed at Seton.”

Olivia became involved in service-learning and campus ministry, and she attributes her experience with junior retreat and Kairos as a big step in her relationship with God as well as a way to grow closer to her classmates. “In the early years of my own personal faith journey, these events helped me to strengthen my prayer life, allowing me to grow and mature emotionally, and be confident in opening up to other people without fear of rejection,” said Olivia.

Olivia earned her degree in Early Childhood Education at Mount St. Joseph University in 2016. She is currently a pre-school teacher in Bridgetown where she has been for nine years. Within the past decade, she underwent double cochlear-implant surgery. “Every day I wake up, thanking God for a new day and praying that Jesus would use me for His divine purposes,” she explained. “The many personal trials that I have endured throughout my life have allowed me to grow deeper in my faith and strengthen my relationship with Jesus. I have learned that our struggles are what strengthen us,” she added. “God continually reminds me that true rest, strength and freedom are found in Him.”



Erika entered Seton as a freshman and immediately felt inspired. Her freshman Religion class taught by Mr. Al Kovacic was a big inspiration. “His teachings and reflections really helped me to make my faith a more personal thing,” Erika explained. “This started the journey of me wanting to truly live my life for God.”

Another influential adult during Erika’s high school years was Sr. Sandy Howe. “Throughout each of my years at Seton I would volunteer at City Gospel Mission early in the mornings with Sr. Sandy. Her love for God was evident and she became a role model for me,” Erika said, adding that serving those experiencing homelessness is still a weekly part of her life today.

Another huge aspect of Erika’s high school experience was being on the Varsity Soccer team. It was a special opportunity for her older sister to be the team manager. “I do believe that it was all part of God’s plan to have Olivia as the big sister on the sideline supporting the first two years of Erika’s high school career,” said Lisa. “Being a freshman on Varsity had its challenges, as did Olivia transferring from a different school; but God showed them both that He was there with them, leading them and giving them strength and support.”

Lisa learned a great deal from her own high-school-age daughters, which has helped her develop into the coach she is today. “Throughout Olivia and Erika’s high school years I witnessed tremendous strength, trust and growth in their faith, which in turn helped me dig deeper into my faith,” explained Lisa. “They both had their own personal struggles that they had to overcome, just as any high school student goes through. I witnessed Olivia and Erika leaning into their faith. When a parent witnesses their own child overcoming struggles by leaning more into their faith, it is a beautiful gift!”

Erika was involved with student government and also elected Pep Club President her senior year. Those leadership skills extended to her senior year soccer season where an opportunity arose that she did not see coming. The team only had two wins during the regular season. “If you knew me in high school you knew that I lived and breathed soccer,” said Erika. “It was during this time that it clicked for me that the sport I loved to play was a part of the unique way God made me, and how cool would it be if I used that to glorify Him?” She headed into the post-season with an idea for the team to dedicate the rest of their games to God and His glory. “We started praying together before each game and writing scriptures on our arms,” she explained. “Through this time our entire team devoted ourselves to God, and we went on quite the tournament run! The team that only won two regular season games became District Champions!”

Lisa began coaching soccer for Seton that same year as an assistant on the freshman team. “Being asked to be a high school coach was so important to me, as I saw first-hand how important it was to coach each individual player for their own strengths and weaknesses,” Lisa said. “I knew that high school is such an important developmental time for young athletes. It goes by so incredibly fast, and it can shape their entire future. I wanted to make sure I was making it a positive experience for each and every player on and off the field.”

Later that year, Erika asked her mom and sister if they all could go on a mission trip to Guatemala. “It was a week together that I believe changed us forever,” said Lisa. “It was a week of loving orphans, working in their villages, worshipping together, sharing meals together and showing them endless love. We witnessed God’s presence with us every step of the way, leading us, keeping us safe and showing us that His love is endless.”

It was that passion for her faith that led Erika back to Seton after she graduated from college. She began a ministry where she could help athletes grow in their faith through the sports that they played. “My faith and soccer meant so much to me, and teaching others to use their sport to glorify God meant a lot,” Erika said. After two years she felt that God was calling her to be more present with her young, growing family. “At this same time God was molding my mom into an incredible leader and role model for so many athletes at Seton. It was an honor to pass the baton of athletic ministry off to her and see her shine in this role,” said Erika.

Spiritual growth and sharing God’s unfailing love is something that is so clear if you know Coach LaRosa. Her journey in life, however, has involved facing trials, hardships and fear multiple times. In 2003 Lisa’s father passed away suddenly at the age of 62. “I was so angry at God for many years,” she said. “I did not understand why God had to take him home without warning.” But as the years passed, she learned to lean more into her faith. The mission trip in 2013 helped open her eyes and her heart. “I knew that I had to let go of the anger, and I wanted to build a stronger relationship with Jesus. I was able to witness my daughters’ trust in Jesus throughout that week and it changed me,” Lisa added. “Fast forward a few years, and from my own personal struggles I learned that God’s love for me is so grand that all the hardships we endure are blessings that ultimately make us stronger and bring us closer to Him.”



Lisa continued to coach at Seton over the next several years. She had worked her way to Assistant Varsity Soccer Coach, and then to an Assistant Cross Country Coach for a season, Track & Field Hurdle Coach for three seasons and then back to soccer. Throughout all this time she kept asking God if she was doing His will. “Each season I prayed asking God to lead me where I am supposed to be and to show me my purpose.”

In 2019, Lisa’s mother passed away and both Lisa and Mike were blessed to be in the room. “On that beautiful Monday morning on March 18, I lost my best friend and an extraordinary mother; but I was also given an incredible gift. I felt God’s love fill her room, and I witnessed God’s love taking her home to the most beautiful peaceful place that we all hope for,” she explained. “Later that day I asked God for a sign that my mom and dad were together again. When we returned home, Olivia was looking out the window at two beautiful dove birds sitting on our deck where she said they had been for an hour. I knew that was my sign.”

As if losing her mother wasn’t enough heartache, in the fall of 2019, Lisa was diagnosed with colorectal cancer. While she was still serving as an Assistant Varsity Soccer Coach at this time, she felt that maybe God could be telling her that it was time to step away from Seton Athletics and focus on her family.

A few months later she was cancer free and took the advice of her doctor to have genetic testing done. On March 18, 2020 at 3:18 p.m., exactly one year after her mom passed away, Lisa received a phone call with the genetic testing results. The risk markers came back positive for breast, colon, melanoma and gastrointestinal cancers. “I started to cry and told the nurse that it was a gift from my mother and a gift from the Lord,” Lisa said. “I believe whole-heartedly that God was showing me that my story was not finished; that it was just the beginning.”

Over the next nine months Lisa had three major surgeries – a complete hysterectomy, her gallbladder removed and a double mastectomy. Through prayer and with the encouragement of her husband and family, she was still with the soccer team. In the spring of 2021, Lisa had her third melanoma removed. The first two times were in 2008 and 2012. “As I see it, finding this cancer was a blessing,” said Lisa. “I was told that it was a fast-growing cancer. Once again, it was with the grace of God that I was sent to a new doctor and a new set of eyes, so it was caught early.”

Every time that she questioned if she should step away from coaching, she learned by listening to God that she was exactly where she was supposed to be.

In 2022, the Seton Varsity Soccer team won the OHSAA D1 State Championship. "I was blessed to witness each and every member believe completely in God's plan for them and our team," said Lisa. "They *believed* in one another every step of the way until they reached their *piece of gold* and became the first-ever Seton Soccer State Champions!"



In addition to the state title in 2022, the Seton Varsity Soccer Team has also made it to the final four in the state tournament for the last two seasons. Success is evident throughout the athletic program as all Seton teams continue to embrace their walk with God and play for a bigger purpose. "I witnessed our volleyball team that is full of talented individuals come together as one unit trusting in God's plan for them, and they became the OHSAA Division 1 State Champions," said Lisa. "Our Cross Country team met often with me and also did faith building on their own. They saw the goodness of God when they placed 6th as a team at Regionals, and when Heidi Harmeyer '26 told me that she fully trusted God's plan, she made it to the State Championship race individually where she placed 15th overall," said Lisa. "God is good and faithful and is always leading the way."



The following year Lisa was asked to be a spiritual leader for all of the Seton varsity teams. Through various faith-building activities, Lisa inspires all student-athletes. "Our faith-building consists of breaking down scriptures and then doing an activity that helps

bring them closer to God and to one another," explained Lisa. "They enjoy writing in their journals and writing prayers for one another; and then we worship through music and end with a prayer."

This past fall, Lisa's husband, Mike, contacted Seton President Kathy Allen Ciarla '87 with an idea to nominate Lisa for a national coaching award. The Seton community responded with current and past players, parents, coaches, administration, family and friends all sending in their nomination forms for Lisa. She was then named as the recipient of the 2024 Faith-Based Coaches' Award as part of the United Soccer Coaches Communities Awards of Excellence.

Faith in athletics is tightly woven here at Seton, and it's not just the student-athletes who are better for it. "The reward of coaching is so much bigger than anything I could have ever dreamed of," said Lisa. "The messages I receive from past and current athletes with scriptures and beautiful sunrises or sunsets is so much bigger and more than me – it's all from God's goodness, love and blessings."

As she continues to walk through life with God, she feels more thankful each day. "I am eternally grateful for my supportive family, my strong faith and all the pieces of my story," explained Lisa. "I'm beyond blessed to have been chosen 12 years ago to be the one the Seton athletes call Coach LaRosa and for the opportunity Seton has given me to live out my faith with these incredible young women." Her message is consistent and carries on through so many athletes year after year. "There is gold in every piece of your story," Lisa shares. "Keep your eyes *up* and *believe!*"



Seton High School is excited to announce plans for the \$16M SPORTS COMPLEX DEVELOPMENT **SETON SPORTS COMPLEX**

ON 11 ACRES IN DELHI TOWNSHIP

Seton High School purchased 11 acres of land in Delhi Township on Delhi Pike, Greenwell Avenue, Klemme Drive and Glenroy Avenue, and construction began in March. The SETON SPORTS COMPLEX, known as THE SC, will be only eight minutes away from Seton's campus. It will be open for the 2026 fall sports season!

Plans for the complex include a turf field for Soccer, Lacrosse and Flag Football, an eight-lane outdoor Track with Field event space, Tennis and Pickleball courts, seating and parking.

In addition, the facility will boast a two-story athletic center fully equipped to give Seton student-athletes the best amenities in health and wellness including a state-of-the-art weight room, training room, team meeting rooms, health and wellness center, batting tunnels, golf simulator and locker rooms. Fans can enjoy a concession area with outdoor dining, a spirit shop, restrooms and ample stadium seating for viewing the competitions. The athletic center also features four well-appointed luxury suites for an optimal fan experience and a press box with broadcasting capabilities.

"The SC will transform our school and take our competitive athletic program to the next level by providing our students with exceptional facilities to enhance their talents and focus on their health and wellness. Seton High School values the importance of a robust, well-rounded educational experience, and is dedicated to providing students with the best possible experience to develop strong, independent young women," said Seton President Kathy Allen Ciarla '87.

The cost for this renovation will be funded by donors and grants. This is part of the Seton Centennial fundraising initiative of which Seton is in the first phase.



When Angie was a student at Seton, she was in the National Honor Society, Spanish National Honor Society and was a Student Ambassador. "The academic courses at Seton helped me to be very well-prepared for my college classes and workload," said Angie, who is a third-year student at the University of Cincinnati. "It pushed me to always put my best foot forward, especially academically. Seton taught me how to manage my time and helped me to gain strong test-taking skills. If it weren't for the education that I received there, I wouldn't be where I am today as a successful college junior," she said.

Beyond the classroom, spending time as a Student Ambassador helped Angie to become the confident, well-rounded and service-minded young adult that she has become. "This piqued my interest in volunteering and helping members throughout the community."

She also found inspiration and guidance from one of her teachers, Monica Perretta – who the students often refer to as Señora. "She was my Spanish teacher for two years, and she always encouraged me to move forward in everything in life," explained Angie. "She gave me support in my academics and pushed me to never give up

on myself, taught me the importance of embracing my culture and always applauded me for my successes."
